Don Feke, vice provost for undergraduate education, said CWRU posedguidelines stop short of proscribing correct activities for undergraduate teaching assistants, then it is integrity of the services provided by undergraduate teaching assistants proposed guidelines are a good first step in the right direction. Teaching assistants, unlike supplemental instructors etimes assess student work, and in some cases undergraduate teaching assistants have been used to deliver instruction in absence of the instructor. There was some iscussion about the value of undergraduate teaching assistants; for first year classes and in some lab courses, undergraduate teaching assistants are often considered to be more effective than graduate student teaching assistants. The Executive Committed to approve the Guidelines for Participation of Undergraduate Teaching Assistants chalf of the Faculty Senate; the approved guidelines are attached to these meeting minutes.
