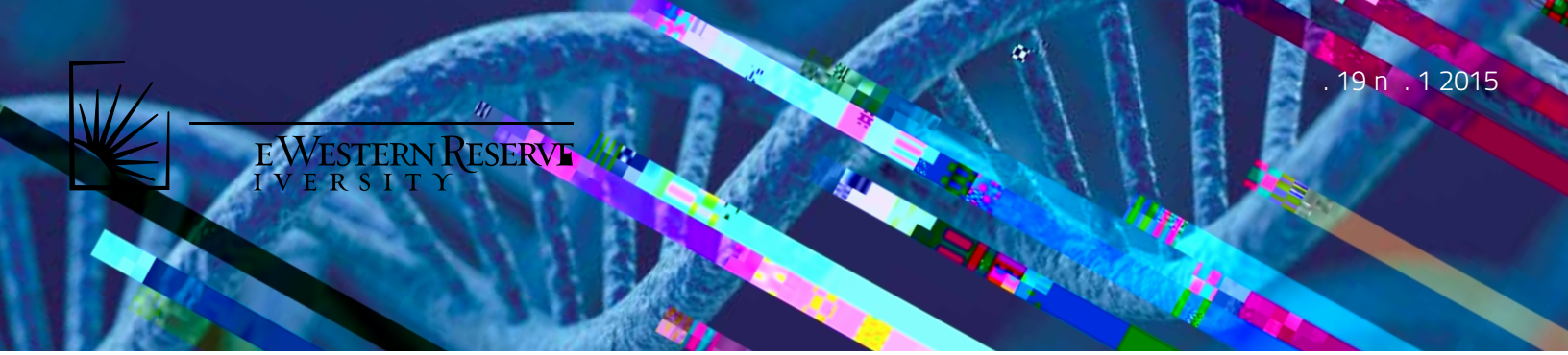

Published twice a year, each issue of *Health Matrix* includes a table of major changes, along with student notes, often include the editor's final comments.

One issue each year is a major issue on a significant health topic, such as end-of-life care, bioethics, biotechnology, health care reform, emerging genetic engineering, health care and telemedicine and bioethics health care access.

JD/MA (Bioethics)

The Department of Bioethics at the School of Medicine offers an MA in Bioethics, which focuses on the ethical, cultural and legal dimensions of health care, technology and the life sciences. The three courses and 1/2 each semester have the interdisciplinary and interdisciplinary nature of the field, and include a significant clinical component. This is an interdisciplinary health law and management concentration in Health System Management, taking the electrical and financial eligible careers in the field, which may be combined with the MBA.

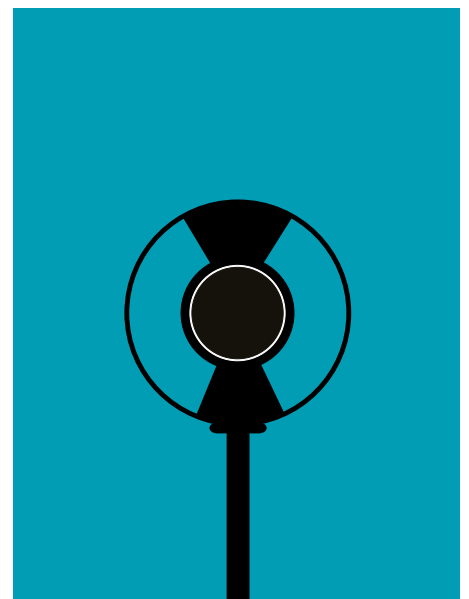

Inaugural Maxwell J. Mehlman Lecture explores ADA's impact

The American with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) specifically mentions health care as an area in which discrimination still exists. From since its enactment, individuals with disabilities continue to experience fundamental challenges in the workplace, education, public accommodations, and health care. This lecture explored the impact of the disability rights movement on medical ethics, decision-making and health care reform.

The second annual Mehlman Lecture, The Role of Law in Building a Culture of Health, will be held at the Center for Health Law, Policy and Ethics on October 8, 2015. The keynote speaker is Katherine Hatt, '80, Vice President, General Counsel and Secretary, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

The clinic experience allows students to take a real-world approach to health law. Health Law Clinic students are involved in child and adult social security disability claims, guardianship proceedings, access to health care, special education for children with disabilities and the health and disability law-related administrative and court proceedings. This year, students will be involved in an ongoing VA disability benefit and appeals in a nationally ranked University of Health Law.

Each student takes a maximum of five hours per week, and engage in a full-time hearing, trial and negotiation. On an ongoing basis, the students in the clinic, may find themselves conducting an administrative medical or financial expert disability claim, drafting an advanced health care directive for an ailing client seeking to obtain advance care for a client. Students can also be trained and certified as a legal Long Term Care Ombudsman. Certified students gain insight into the legal elements, mitigation and administrative appeal.

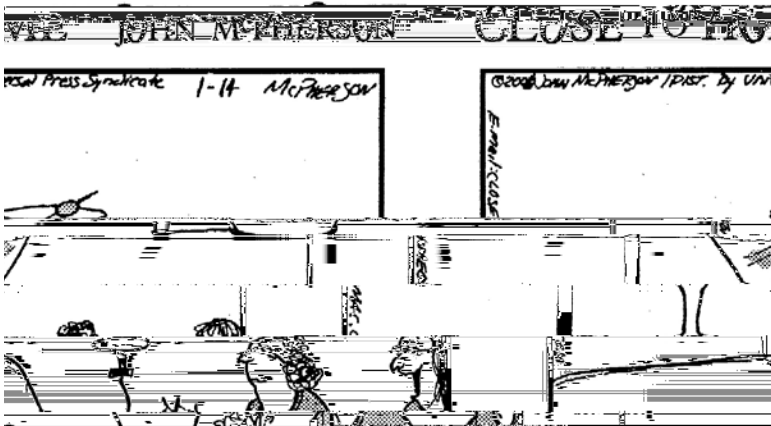
